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CHICAGO SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA PRESENTS *BEETHOVEN #9* VIRTUAL CONCERT FRIDAY, JANUARY 29TH 7:00 PM EVTV CHANNEL 1960

Classical guitarist Collin Holloway began playing at the age of nine in his home town of Oklahoma City. His passion for the instrument and natural talent were cultivated by Matthew Denman who acted as a teacher and mentor to Collin during his adolescence. As a student at the Classen SAS performing arts middle/high school, he was the first student in school history to reach the highest level of the guitar department at only 12 years old. Before departing for college, Collin gave his first solo recital to an audience of 150 that was met with two standing ovations.

Collin's performing experience is extensive for such a young guitarist. He has toured across much of America and Spain as a soloist and as a part of various ensembles in festivals such as "Austin City Limits", "CHAMBERart Madrid", the "Celedonio Romero Guitar institute", in addition to a recent solo tour of Oklahoma and Florida.

Most recently, Collin traveled to Vercelli, Italy where he spent a week studying privately with the renowned guitarist, composer, and musicologist Angelo Gilardino.

After completion of his secondary schooling, Collin went on to further develop his talent at the Eastman School of Music. After graduating from Eastman with a bachelors of music degree in 2019, he was offered a teaching assistantship at the University of Kentucky College of Fine Arts. At University of Kentucky, he is also pursuing his masters degree in performance under the direction of Professor Dieter Hennings.

Eight years later, Valjean becomes the guardian of a child named Cosette after her mother's death, but Javert's relentless pursuit means that peace will be a long time coming.



HISTORY OF GROUND HOG DAY FEBRUARY 2ND

On February 2, 1887, Groundhog Day, featuring a rodent meteorologist, is celebrated for the first time at Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania. According to tradition, if a groundhog comes out of its hole on this day and sees its shadow, it gets scared and runs back into its burrow, predicting six more weeks of winter weather; no shadow means an early spring.

Groundhog Day has its roots in the ancient Christian tradition of Candlemas, when clergy would bless and distribute candles needed for winter. The candles represented how long and cold the winter would be. Germans expanded on this concept by selecting an animal—the hedgehog—as a means of predicting weather. Once they came to America, German settlers in Pennsylvania continued the tradition, although they switched from hedgehogs to groundhogs, which were plentiful in the Keystone State.

Groundhogs, also called woodchucks and whose scientific name is *Marmota monax*, typically weigh 12 to 15 pounds and live six to eight years. They eat vegetables and fruits, whistle when they're frightened or looking for a mate (they're sometimes called whistle pigs) and can climb trees and swim.

They go into hibernation in the late fall; during this time, their body temperatures drop significantly, their heartbeats slow from 80 to five beats per minute and they can lose 30 percent of their body fat. In February, male groundhogs emerge from their burrows to look for a mate (not to predict the weather) before going underground again. They come out of hibernation for good in March.

In 1887, a newspaper editor belonging to a group of groundhog hunters from Punxsutawney called the Punxsutawney Groundhog Club declared that Phil, the Punxsutawney groundhog, was America's only true weather-forecasting groundhog. The line of groundhogs that have since been known as Phil might be America's most famous groundhogs, but other towns across North America now have their own weather-predicting rodents, from Birmingham Bill to Staten Island Chuck to Shubenacadie Sam in Canada.

In 1993, the movie *Groundhog Day* starring Bill Murray popularized the usage of "groundhog day" to mean something that is repeated over and over. Today, tens of thousands of people converge on Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney each February 2 to witness Phil's prediction.

Vince Lewis is a veteran jazz performer, composer and recording artist.

Since actively pursuing a solo career he has achieved national acclaim and airplay, as well as outstanding critical reviews in every major jazz publication.

Vince has been a Heritage Guitar, Inc. performing artist since 1991, and a Benedetto Guitar artist since 2012, a Breedlove acoustic guitar artist since 2014 and an Eastman Guitars artist since 2015. He also performs and records with his signature Vince Lewis Model Ralston Archtop Guitar. He has recorded for Noteworthy Jazz, Redstone Jazz, Jim Martin Productions and also Vinbara Music.

He has been a headliner with Dave Brubeck, B.B King, Ellis Marsalis, Lou Rawls, John Pizzarelli and Melissa Manchester.

In 2012 Vince was recognized in the Jazz Guitar category as one of the "Leading Active Jazz Artists" by *Jazz Inside Magazine*.

Jim Carlton, in *Conversations with Great Jazz and Studio Guitarists* says "His playing is indicative of the rarified air of true mastery. He routinely creates engaging and excellent music."

HANDEL'S TRUMPET CONCERTOS

The trumpet that we know today has come a long way. Trumpets did not always have valves as they do today. In fact valved trumpets did not come around until the early/middle part of the 19th century. Until then trumpets were long, wound up pieces of brass, similar to a modern bugle. These trumpets played in two registers. The lower sounding register, known as the "Principale" consisted mainly of the natural harmonic series. This means that it could not play a full scale. The upper sounding register is known as the "Clarino", and is very difficult to play in, however one can achieve full scales and chromatic pitches.

The Baroque trumpet flourished during a period known as the "High Baroque" era, which was during the late 1600's and early 1700's. Composers such as Handel and Bach wrote music for the Baroque, or "natural", trumpet. Handel's "Messiah" features a solo for Baroque trumpet in the song "The Trumpet Shall Sound". One of the most famous pieces, and most difficult, of the trumpet repertoire is "Brandenburg Concerto No. 2" by J.S. Bach. Both of these pieces require great skill on the instrument.

Handel composed his *Trumpet Concerto in D major* in 1762. It has only two movements and is scored for trumpet, two horns and strings. The introductory movement, an Andante, starts with a main theme, an ornamented scale, developing into sequences until the entry of the solo trumpet.

Over time specialty clarino playing became a rarity, with very few players being able to achieve clarity and sound in the upper register. This slow decline in clarino trumpet players led to the demise of the Baroque trumpet. The main use of trumpets was for fanfares and for accenting the main chords in a musical piece.

Of late, the Baroque trumpet has enjoyed a nice revival, with several people around the world specializing in the performance of Baroque trumpet playing.

A few things to know before you get started:


This challenge began *Monday January 18th* and ends *Wednesday February 24th, 2021*.

Track the number of minutes you are moving each day and record it on the calendar/tracker that will be provided.






